

Oak Hill ES Media Center Collection Development Plan 2023-24

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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Oak Hill ES serves 455 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 40% Hispanic and 60% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 42% White, 48% Black, 1% Native, 4% Asian, 2% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Cicely Marks and Assistant Principal Michelle Fuist/. Oak Hill ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Sunshine State Book Club, Battle of the Books, Safety Patrol, VPK, Garden Club, Drumline, Fit Club, and Disney Musicals in Schools.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Oak Hill ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2011 and the number of books per student is 18. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Oak Hill ES does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Students in Oak Hill ES improved on the state achievement tests in ELA in 3rd grade. However, ELA scores went down in 4th and 5th grades.
- Based on the reading scores, more books should be purchased on lower reading levels.
- Many of our students read in their native language as well as English. While our collection includes many Spanish titles, we have a need for titles in Portuguese and Haitian-Creole.
- Graphic novels comprise 2.8 percent of the collection, but is the most popular genre.
- Purchases of new books will focus on foreign language books and lower level books, as well as new and popular graphic novels.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project expectations as well as duplicate copies of SSYRA books and nonfiction fables and folklore.



Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.



Collection Analysis by Category

The information collected in this section provides a detailed look at the current library collection by classification and genre. The information was gathered from Follett Destiny, the library management system, and Titlewave, the vendor's ordering and analysis tool.

Notes

- Graphic novels are only 2.8 percent of the collection, but circulate the most of any genre.
- Nonfiction titles should on average be 5 years or newer; our collection is considerably older.
- With the introduction of a new makerspace in our media center, we have a need for a larger collection of both arts and STEM titles.

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Oak Hill ES in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Notes

- The number of Black titles exceeds the number of Hispanic titles, even though there is a higher percentage of Hispanic students at Oak Hill ES.
- This gap can be partially closed by purchasing more Portuguese and Brazilian titles.
